SUBSIDIES TO ENERGY SOURCES IN BRAZIL

As the world heats up, Brazil grants five times more resources to fossil fuels than to renewables

Subsidies to energy sources are government resources aimed at supporting or expanding energy production and consumption through

tax exemptions and direct spending.

Eliminating fossil subsidies is a crucial step to prevent the world from surpassing the 2 degrees Celsius global warming limit by the end of the century. Furthermore, it is a pledge made by the G20 since 2009.

However, in Brazil, fossil fuels continue to receive increased incentives. In 2022, federal subsidies for the production and consumption of oil, gas, and coal reached \$ 14.56 billion, which is equivalent to a 29% growth compared to 2021 and 64.6% compared to 2018.

The trend is global: 2022 was a record year. G20 countries alone account for more than \$ **1.4** trillion spent on subsidies, financing and investments in fossil fuels.

Renewable energy is not granted the same level of subsidies: over the last five years, it received five times fewer incentives from the Brazilian government than fossil fuels.






SUBSIDIES TO ENERGY SOURCES IN BRAZIL


